

Heads Up

Smiles were a plenty this week as we welcomed the whole school community back, following school closure to many in January. It really was fabulous to see everyone bounding up to school each morning this week, enthusiastic and ready to learn. We look forward to a productive run up to Easter and beyond.

A huge well done! Firstly for all that you have done during lockdown with regard to supporting your child(ren) with their learning, and secondly in preparing them so well for the return to school after such a long time. It really has been an unusual and difficult time for many and there are natural concerns that some have expressed, especially the media, about children falling behind. I would like to take the opportunity to try to reassure you that we have in place targeted interventions and catch-up tuition which is overseen by Miss Major and directed by the class teachers to get children back on the trajectory they should be on. Our catch-up tuition starts again next Monday and Tuesday and our Maths on the Move programme commenced this week for Year 2 and Year 4. In addition, the teachers are assessing where the children are this week before implementing targeted support within and outside the classroom, to be led by the teaching assistants assigned to each class.

On the final page of the newsletter you will find key dates for the remainder of this term and for the summer. There are a few key changes I need to make you aware of. Unfortunately, the restrictions will not be lifted in time for the Year 6 residential at Osmington Bay, so the trip is in the process of being cancelled and payments will be returned to you before Easter. We have contacted Mill on the Brue in Bruton to see if we can provide similar outdoor educational experiences for a day visit and have a provisional date of 21st May.

Next week I will try to ensure that we start to share aspects of our celebration assemblies that we hold on a Friday. I did intend to today, but was rather let down by the technology. I will try again next Friday.


Virtual Story Time







Written as a 'boys' novel' and first published in the magazine Young Folks from May to July 1886, the novel has attracted praise and admiration of writers as diverse

as Henry James, Jorge Luis Borges and Seamus Heaney.

embarrassed to be seen with Davey, but little by little he has to admit, when it's just the two of them, Davey is a lot of fun. But then something terrible happens to Davey. Told in verse, in first person, this is the touching story of an extraordinary friendship, that changes tow boys lives for ever. An uplifting tale that truly sings out.



67. The Railway Children by E Nesbit When Father goes away with two strangers one evening, the lives of Roberta, Peter and Phyllis are shattered. They and their mother have to move from their comfortable London home to go and live in a simple country cottage, where Mother writes books to make ends meet. However, they soon

come to love the railway that runs near their cottage, and they make a habit of waving to the Old Gentleman who rides on it. They befriend the porter, Perks, and through him learn railway lore and much else. They have many adventures and when they save a train from disaster, they are helped by the Old Gentleman to solve the mystery of their father's disappearance and the family is happily reunited.


65. Cinderella by Charles Perrault, illustrated by

62. Zoo by Anthony Browne Dad, mum and two brothers spend a day at the zoo, looking at the animals in the cages - or is it the animals that are looking at them?



61. Coraline by Neil Gaiman There is something strange about Oraline Coraline's new home. It's not the mist, or the cat that always seems to be watching her, nor the signs of danger that Miss Spinks and Miss Forcible, her new neighbours, read in the tea leaves. It's the other house—the one behind the old door in the drawing room. Another mother and father with

black-button eyes and papery skin are waiting for Coraline to join them there. And they want her to stay with them. For ever. She knows that is she ventures through that door, she may never come back.

Have Your Circumstances Changed?

Children who attend a Somerset County Council school, whose parents or carers receive certain benefits may be entitled to free school meals.

These are the benefits.

- · Universal Credit with an annual household income of less than £7,400 after tax
- · Income Support (IS)
- · Employment and Support Allowance (Income related) - not Contribution related
- · Income-based Job Seekers Allowance (IBJSA) not Contribution based
- · Guaranteed Element of State Pension Credit.
- · Support under Part 6 of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- · Child Tax Credit with an annual taxable income (as assessed by HMRC) of less than £16,190, as long as the family is not also in receipt of Working Tax Credit.

If you have recently become unemployed, but are still receiving Working Tax Credits, you may be entitled to free school meals.

During the coronavirus outbreak, the Government are temporarily extending free school meal eligibility to include children of families who have no recourse to public funds. Therefore, children will also be eligible for free school meals if their legal guardians' household income is £7,400 or below and they meet one of the following criteria:

- · you are a Zambrano Carer
- you have the right to remain in the UK under Article 8 of the European Convention on Human Rights (ECHR) and are subject to no recourse to public funds
- · you are supported under Section 17 of the Children Act 1989 (Children in Need)

You may also be eligible if they are supported under section 4 of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999.

If you meet this additional criteria, complete the Free School Meals Application Form Covid-19 additional criteria Form and send it in with the appropriate evidence.

British Science Week 2021

To ease ourselves back into the routines of school and take part in British Science Week, the children in KS2 have had a special treat in watching a screen production: 'The Light Fantastic' - produced by The Kinetic Theatre Company, who have in the past been able to visit the school.

This time via video link the children joined Roy Gee, a little known Country and Western singer, who runs out of fuel in the middle of a black and white desert! Once refuelled, he discovers The Light Fantastic Café – a 50's American style Burger Bar with one main curious feature – it still has all its colour when the rest of the world has not!

From this the children have been inspired to explore and discover more about 'light' through various activities. KS1 children have also been carrying out their own science projects.
